***From the priest-in-charge***

***Bad Friday / Good Friday***

Every year we struggle with two puzzling questions:

We know what happened on Good Friday, but why?

We know why the Resurrection is good news, but what happened?

Searching the scriptures shows us that the Gospels have carefully reported accounts of the arrest, trial, crucifixion, and burial of the Galilean prophet. In fact, the slight discrepancies among Matthew, Mark, Luke and John only enhance their credibility: no two witnesses report what they see exactly, and different writers tell the same story at different times, in different places, and for different purposes.

The same search of the Easter narratives shows radically different accounts about who found the tomb empty, what and whom they saw, how they reported it, and what the reaction was. Besides, Mark, our evangelist for this Easter, had NO resurrection narratives at all, but leaves us at 16:8 with the women running away and telling no-one "because they were afraid."

This all suggests that we are asking the wrong questions. We are challenged to face the same task as that band of scared, angry, guilt-ridden, frustrated Palestinian Jews had to face:

Does the cross mean that Jesus was *dead wrong* and that this hideous death of a good man is the ultimate in human tragedy?

OR Have the heart-felt yearnings of all people, rising out of both the deep piety of God's covenant with Israel and the broad promises of Greek culture and Roman law, actually been fulfilled through Jesus' powerful wisdom, compassion and courage--the ultimate in divine comedy?

Soon (a few hours, a few days, even many years--however long it took) they realized that the crucifixion, the worst imaginable example of human cruelty and weakness, was and is and always will be the story about how the God of love and power has the last word about life--as, indeed, God had the first word, from Genesis 1 ("Behold, it is very good") to Revelation 22 ("No more shall there be anything accursed"). He "by whom all things were made" is he "who died for us and for our salvation." He is the Alpha and the Omega.

Maybe the story could have been told more simply. But maybe God expects us, like the three women, to face our fears and *then* to rejoice in our salvation. And so our "hosannas" (God help us!) are turned into "Halleluiahs" (Praise the Lord!). Happy Easter.

## ***Highlights from the Mar. 10th Vestry Meeting***

The Shrove Tuesday Pancake Dinner was a big success with 100 people in attendance. Kudos to Mary Jane Shanks and Ashby Shanks and everyone who helped them! Mary Jane has generously offered to donate the cost of the food for the Pancake Dinner to the Church. The Vestry agreed to donate all dinner proceeds to Outreach, directing the donation to United Churches Assistance Network, a worthy Baltimore County organization that provides help to people in seven zip codes in Northern Baltimore County.

The Vestry approved the 2009 Operating Budget as it was presented to the congregation at the Annual Meeting. The Vestry agreed not to modify the 2009 budgeted amount for the choir, but discussions are ongoing regarding how we might reduce this cost without compromising the quality of the program.

Jeremy Gillam and Michael Riisager will serve as liaisons to the Vestry for the Search Committee. Any candidate names should be directed to Susan Anthony's attention.

## ***Message from the Senior Warden***

Dear fellow parishioners,

Most of you are aware that before the Search Committee could begin its work, Immanuel needed to prepare a parish profile to describe our congregation, our activities, community and

expectations of our new rector. You may be less aware of a very specific and critical task that the Vestry undertook as a prelude to the Search Committee getting underway. The Vestry, through considerable, thoughtful deliberation and prayer, developed a written "Charge to the Search Committee" that described selected critical aspects of the search process. Probably the most critical decision the Vestry had to make to include in the Charge is whether we would search for a full-time or part-time rector.

Our financial reality is that even if we called a part-time rector, even just 50% time, we would still be drawing upon the principle from our endowment to make ends meet. To quote from the Charge,  
*"we are conscious and concerned that we are not living within our means and that every year we balance our budget only by using money from our endowment fund (interest and principle) at a rate that is not sustainable long-term"*. For over five years, for different reasons, we have drawn considerable funds from the endowment to support our annual operating costs. The Vestry had to decide to what extent we would continue to do this to support our next rector.

The decision taken, and passed to the Search Committee, is that they should look for a full-term rector who understands the long-term commitment that implies. Their first mandate is to find the best "fit" between priest and Immanuel and thus, if that person is interested in serving part-time, that will be acceptable, but no less than ¾ time. In deciding to search for a full-term rector, the Vestry is committing substantial resources from the endowment principle, with the understanding that the endowment is to serve the church, as opposed to the church serving the endowment. With this decision, the Vestry, as the elected stewards of our financial resources, has declared that it is ready to take a temporary financial risk to find the best rector to serve our parish and work together with us to grow in our mission as a "piece of God's Kingdom" on a hilltop in Glencoe, Maryland.

## **IMMANUEL GETS NATIONAL RECOGNITION FOR NEW ORGAN**

A beautiful color photograph of Immanuel Church with its new Casavant Pipe Organ, made the front cover of the March 2009 issue of The American Organist magazine, which goes to church organists throughout the United States and Canada. Inside the magazine, Casavant has an article telling about the design and construction of the Immanuel Organ and other modest size instruments for small churches and chapels.

Once a year, each major organ builder in North America has the opportunity to feature, on the

front cover of *The American Organist* magazine, one of their organs that they feel is significant in visual and tonal design, and that would have public appeal. Of all the large instruments that Casavant has built this past year for churches, cathedrals, and concert halls in the United States and in other countries throughout the world, little old Immanuel on the hill in downtown Glencoe won the prize!

This came as quite a surprise, and we feel honored to have received national recognition, considering how many small churches bought new pipe organs in the last two to three years. Last year, the Immanuel Church organ was also featured with color photographs and an article, covering the entire inside back page. ## ***THE HOMINY SAGA***

Recently I relearned a simple lesson: It's the little things in life that matter. Put another way, sometimes little things are really big things in disguise. That's the way it is with a little thing at Immanuel — *The Hominy*.

In a mad moment at my first Vestry meeting, I volunteered to put on this year's Pancake Supper. In my delirium I also volunteered my husband, without his knowledge. (After all, it was his Olympic spatula dexterity flipping pancakes, and the thought of seeing him again in his "Let's Cook Butt" apron, that made me do it.) As soon as the words "We'll do it!" erupted from my mouth, the fear of failure spread like ice-cold water through my veins. What was I thinking? I am a pathological perfectionist! And this event was full of pitfalls.

The very next day a speedy plan of action was launched, starting with a call to my predecessor Betsy Powell, a three-year pancake supper veteran. Betsy said she had stepped into the well-worn shoes of Sue Filar, and explained that Sue had served hominy during her seven-year tenure. Betsy didn't have a written copy of Sue's recipe, but she reassured me that it was easy

enough to make, just throw a few spices, some cheese and hot sauce into hominy and bake.

Well, that was too unmeasured for me. I needed specifics. Being a Southern girl, I decided that I may do better substituting my cheese grits for hominy. Close enough, right? I mentioned my idea to some longtime parishioners and asked how they thought the grits would be received. Their response was quick and blunt. I may as well commit hari kari as mess around with *The Hominy*! GULP!

In a panic to track down the exact recipe, I decided to call the pro herself, Sue Filar. Thus began a whirlwind of emails and phone calls in search of the source of the original hominy recipe in written form. I discovered *The Hominy* trail was littered with footprints of all shapes and sizes. Sue got the recipe from Katie Ritter, who got the recipe from DeaSue Bell, who can't remember who she got the recipe from, but thinks it was from Mary Schomann, who may have gotten it from Hazel Price, who might have inherited it from Lisa Huff. That dated *The Hominy* back to the eighties, and I still hadn't found the original source or a written version of the recipe. How far back does this go, I wondered? Maybe *The Hominy* has been around as long as Immanuel Church, or at least the Parish House. Maybe it was even Anna Austin McCulloch or one of the Mowell ladies who first cooked it for Shrove Tuesday 1881! Wow, a tradition that possibly may have been passed down by the women of Immanuel for over 100 years! Okay, message received! *The Hominy* would be served, recipe or no recipe. I'd be picking rug fibers out of my knees for weeks from the bedside praying marathon needed for my version of *The Hominy* to stand up to such a venerable tradition.

Now sometimes prayers are answered in unexpected ways. A week before the supper, something surprising and very lovely occurred. Sue Filar called and said she wanted to cook *The Hominy* for Immanuel this year. Along with being overwhelmed by her generosity, I was also a little disappointed. I realized I'd been looking forward to becoming a new member of *The Hominy Hons*, those hardy women of Immanuel who have cooked hominy over the years. I am embarrassed to say that I even tried to dissuade

Sue from her generous offer. But she insisted, and I came to my senses. What could be more significant to this Immanuel tradition than to have Sue Filar return to cook her hominy for Shrove Tuesday's 2009 Pancake Supper?

Later I began to wonder if there are other, somewhat veiled, messages we could all glean from *The Hominy* saga. Time goes by, leaving much behind and sometimes forgotten; but much stays the same, enriching what is new. A friend returned is a blessing indeed. Or maybe *The Hominy* is a metaphor for what is happening right now at our small, beloved church resting quietly atop a scenic country hillside. Maybe we, the people, are *The Hominy* of Immanuel.

Historically Immanuel's parishioners have always stood together, working through whatever problems the world hurled their way. If a Parish House basement needed digging out, they dug it. If church school walls needed painting, they painted them. If renovations were needed, they renovated. And if hominy needed cooking, they cooked it. During sparse and abundant years, if anything needed doing, they did it.

Now *that* is a tradition to hold tightly to our hearts as we band together once again to support a new Rector and grow forward, fixing what needs fixing, changing what needs changing, and welcoming new ideas and hopefully new and returning people. But during these exciting and uncertain times, always remember: DON'T MESS WITH THE HOMINY! It's *The Hominy*, the extraordinary people of Immanuel, which will get us through.

Kingsley Smith was pleased that 60 diners paraded behind him and Rudi Horner, playing her horn Pied Piper style, over to the church for the Shrove Tuesday service of confession and absolution and the receipt of ashes. Much to the chagrin of some of the children, all symbols of the Mardi Gras celebration, including the colorful necklaces, paper crowns and masks, were removed and left in the church to mark the first act of sacrifice during the Lenten season.

Not only was the supper fun and filling, it made a profit of a little over \$400. The Vestry decided to donate the proceeds to United Churches Assistance Network, a worthy organization that helps people in seven zip codes in Northern Baltimore County address a variety of needs — eviction, utility bills, housing, food, pharmacy, and other emergencies.
